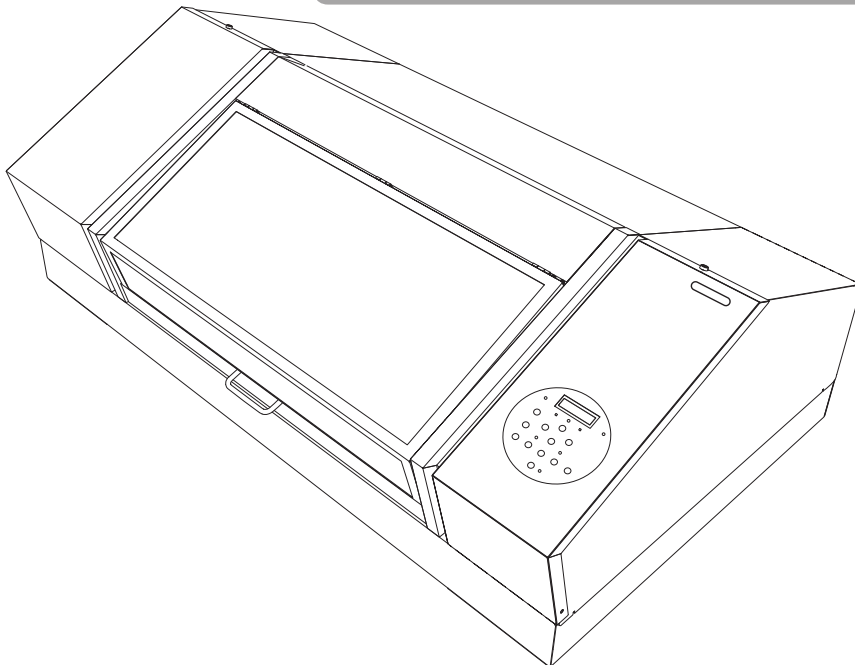

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Chapter 1

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Important Points to Check before Printing

Three Important Points (Measures for UV Reflected Light and Ink Mist)

On this machine, ink affixed on the surface of the print heads might be cured by the reflection of the UV-LED lamp light and by ink mist (ink splashing during printing). If ink affixed on the surface of the print heads is cured, dot drop-outs may occur. Continued use of the product in this state may cause a failure that requires the replacement of the print heads.

While daily cleaning is important to prevent dot drop-outs, there are also three important points to check before printing. Be sure to check the three points given below.

1. You cannot use an object that easily reflects light as the object to be printed on (the media).

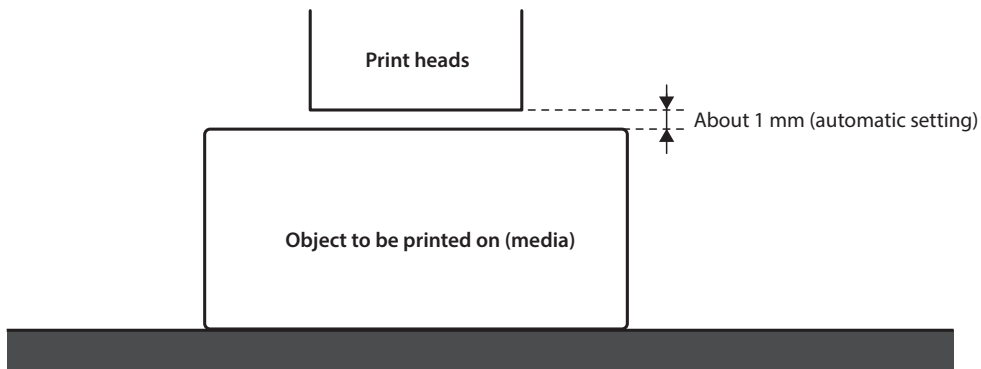
Materials that are likely to reflect the UV-LED lamp light, such as mirrors and stainless steel, promote the curing of the surface of the print heads and therefore cannot be used as the object to be printed on (the media).

2. Make the distance between the surface of the object to be printed on (the media) and the print heads as short as possible.

As the distance between the surface of the object to be printed on (the media) and the print heads increases, the likelihood of ink mist increases. When setting the height of the media manually, make the distance as short as possible. When the height is automatically set, the distance is about 1 mm (39.4 mil).

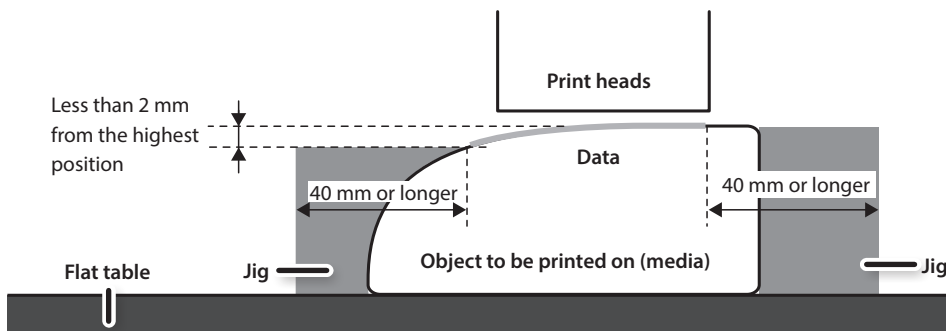
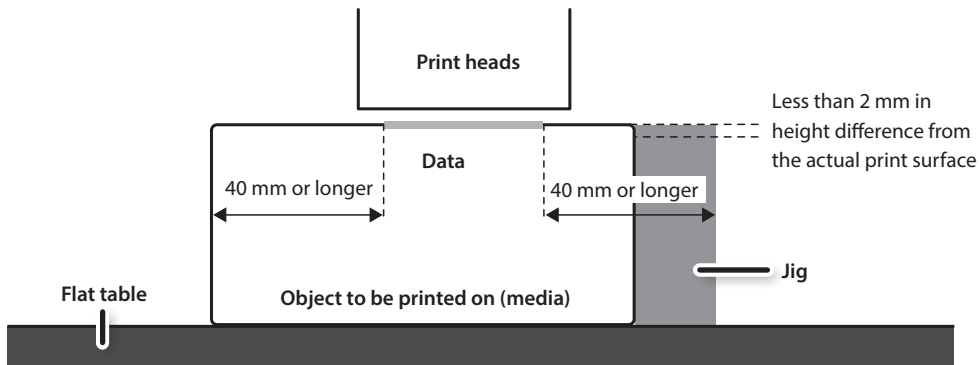
3. A jig might be required depending on the size and shape of the object to be printed on (the media).

Depending on the size and shape of the object to be printed on (the media), the distance between the object to be printed on (the media) and the print heads may increase, which will increase the likelihood of ink mist occurring. In the direction of print heads movement, the object to be printed on (the media) or a jig must be present in the area 40 mm (1.6 in.) to both the right and left of the portion (width) of the data to be printed. In this situation, the difference in height between the surfaces of the object to be printed on (the media) and the jig must be less than 2 mm (78.7 mil).

When a jig is required:

- The object to be printed on (the media) is not large enough to spread over the area 40 mm to both the right and left of the portion (width) of the data to be printed.
- The variation in height of the surface of the object to be printed on (the media) is 2 mm or more.



There are conditions for the height settings when the surface of the object to be printed on (the media) has a height difference. For more information, refer to "Height Settings When the Print Surface is Uneven" (p. 10).

Saving Frequently Used Media Sizes (Preset Function)

You can save media settings in presets. If you save the settings of frequently used media, you can load them instantly and shorten the time required for configuring settings.

Saving the Current Media Setup with a Different Name


The following settings configured in the media setup can be saved as a preset. You can save up to 40 different presets.

- Height position of the media
- Print area (including the print-start location)

You can assign a name to each preset. Using media names for these presets may aid recognition.

Procedure

1. Set up the media (height position, print area), and then check that [SETUP] is lit.
2. Press [MENU].
3. Press [▶], then [▼].


4. Press [▶].
5. Press [▲] or [▼] to select one option from NAME1 to NAME40.


6. Press [ENTER].
The current "height position of the media" and "print area" settings are saved.

7. Press [▲] or [▼] to enter a character.

8. When you have selected the character you want to enter, press [▶].
The characters you can enter are "A" through "Z," "0" through "9," and the "-" character. You can enter up to 15 characters, including spaces.

9. Press [◀] or [▶] to enter the next character.
Enter the following characters in the same way.
10. When you have finished entering text, press [ENTER].
11. Press [MENU], then [◀] to go back to the original screen.

Load a Preset and Print


Load the settings saved in a preset and perform printing.

NOTE

Be sure to hold the handle of the front cover and open and close it gently.

Procedure

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▶] twice.




5. Open the front cover, and then secure the media in place.

8. Start printing.

Printing is performed with the loaded preset settings.

Make Fine Adjustments of Preset Settings and Print

You can change part of a preset and then perform printing.

For instance, you can change the print area only without changing the media height setting.

Procedure

- 1. Load a preset and fix the position of the media by following steps 1 to 7 of "Load a Preset and Print" (p. 7).**
- 2. If you want to change the height setting of the media, set the height of the media.**
 - ☞ Steps 2 to 5 of "2. Setting the Height of the Media Automatically" (First Step Guide)
 - ☞ Steps 4 and 5 of "Setting the Height of the Media Manually" (p. 9)
- 3. If you want to change the print area, set the print area.**

Performing Advanced Setup of the Media

Media Suction Function Setting

The flat table suctions the media to make it hard to move and easy to load.

Procedure

1. Press [PAUSE/VACUUM].

The suction function turns on (or off).

The Suction Function Cannot Be Changed In the Following Situations

- During setup processing
- When the MENU/FUNCTION menu is displayed
- During printing (when printing is paused or is being canceled)
- When an error is displayed

CAUTION!

The suction function cannot be used to hold in place curled or thick media. Secure the media in place using a substance such as commercially available tape affixed directly to the flat table.

Setting the Height of the Media Manually

Manually set the height of the media for printing.

Although the manual setting takes a little longer than the automatic setting because you need to visually set the height, it is suitable when you do not want the head gap sensor to come in contact with the media and when you want to set the distance between the heads and the media.

* If the print surface is uneven, there is a limit to the area of unevenness.


Be sure to hold the handle of the front cover and open and close it gently.

Procedure

1. Secure the media in place on the flat table.

2. Close the front cover.

3. Press [SETUP].

[SETUP] starts to flash.

Performing Advanced Setup of the Media

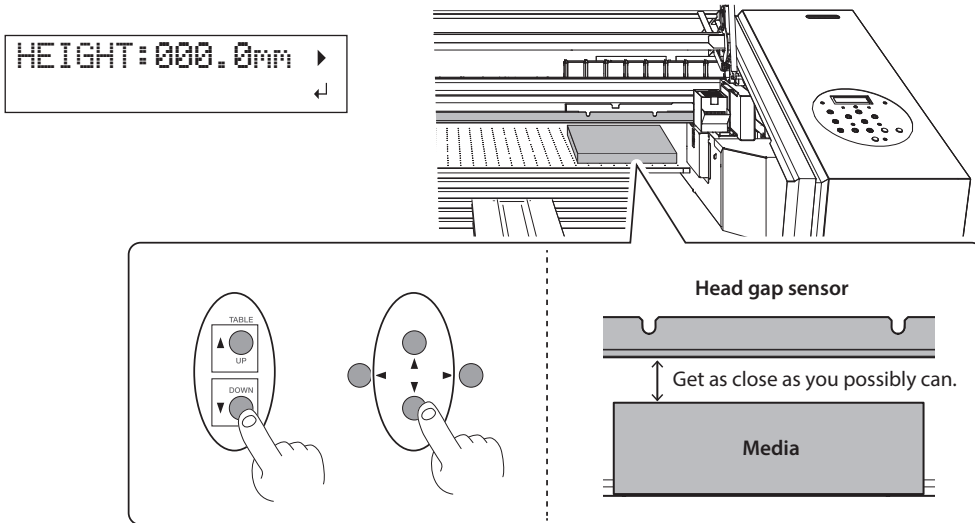
4. Press [▲], [▼], [UP], or [DOWN] to move the flat table.

Move the head gap sensor as close as possible to the print surface.

This step can be performed with the front cover open.

NOTE

Set the height of the table in a way that the highest position of the media (print surface) will not come into contact with the head gap sensor.



When the screen shown in the figure appears



Press [ENTER] on this screen to start the automatic detection of the height. During automatic detection, the head gap sensor comes into contact with the media.

If you do not want to perform automatic detection, press [◀] to return to the original screen.

5. If the front cover is open, close it.

6. When the location is set, press [ENTER].

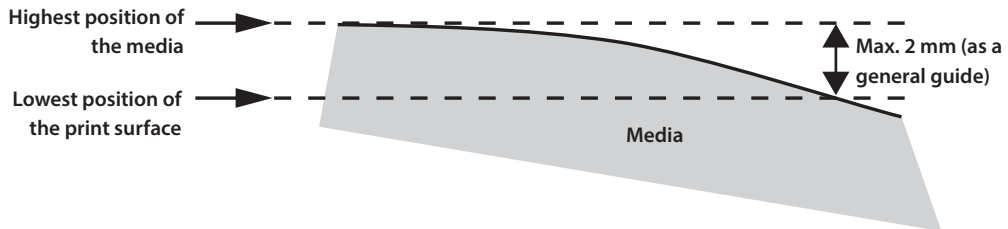
7. Perform the procedure in "Correcting for Misalignment in Bidirectional Printing (Simple)" (p. 20).

Height Settings When the Print Surface is Uneven

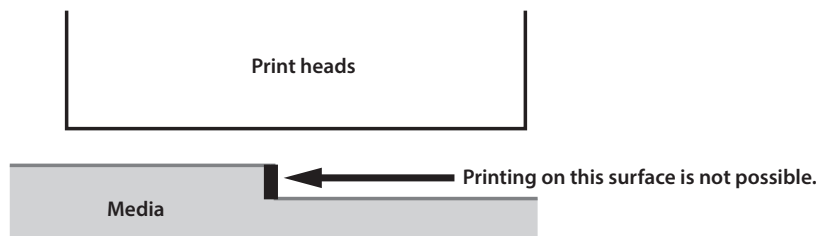
This machine can also print on uneven surfaces. However, note the following points regarding the height setting.

The gap between the "highest position of the media" and the "lowest position of the print surface" should be 2 mm (78.7 mil) or less (as a general guide).

The print quality at the lower position degrades as the height gap widens.



Printing on a surface that is perpendicular to the print heads is not possible.



Expanding the Distance between the Media and the Print Heads

When you set the height of the media automatically (First Step Guide), the distance between the media and the print heads is set to 1.0 mm (39.4 mil) with which optimum printing is performed. However, if the height (thickness) of the media on which printing is performed varies or when the media is lifted or warped during printing, the media might come into contact with the print heads.

You can expand the distance in advance considering the change of the height (thickness) of the media.

NOTE

- If the distance is expanded too much, the print quality may be deteriorated and the nozzles of the print heads may be clogged. Configure the settings so that the distance between the highest position of the media and the lowest position of the print surface is 2 mm or less (p. 11).
 - This setting is enabled when the height of the media is set automatically.

7. Press [ENTER].
8. Press [MENU], then [◀] to go back to the original screen.
9. Perform the procedure in "Correcting for Misalignment in Bidirectional Printing (Simple)" (p. 20).

Setting the Print Area for Each Setup of Media

Usually, when you set up the media, the print area and the base position from the previous setup are set. You can change them every time you set up the media.

Procedure

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] twice to display the screen shown below.

3. Press [▶] twice.

4. Press [▲] or [▼] to select a value.

SET AT SETUP	Explanation
DISABLE (Default setting)	Setup is performed using the print area of the previous setup. The factory default print area is the full area (770 × 330 mm [30.3 × 13 in.]). This setting is suitable when you always perform printing on media of a fixed size.
ENABLE	Set the print area (base position, width, and length of the print area) every time you set up the media. Select this value when the media shape changes for each printing operation.

5. Press [ENTER].
6. Press [MENU], then [◀] to go back to the original screen.

Changing the Print Area

In the factory defaults, the base position (home position) of the print area is at the right front of the flat table and the print area is the full area (770 × 330 mm [30.3 × 13 in.]).

The base position of the print area should be changed according to the shape of the media.

You can reduce the print time if you narrow (limit) the print area.

Determining the Base Position of the Print Area (Home Position)

Determine the home position used as the base to set the print area.

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] twice to display the screen shown below.

6. Press [▲] or [▼] to select the base position.

SET BASE POS.	Print Object
LOWER R	Set the base position (home position) at the front right of the print area. This method is appropriate when the print site is level and you can clearly specify the print area. "Setting the Print Area Using the Lower Right of the Media as the Base Position" (p. 14)
CENTER	Set the base position at the center of the media. This method is appropriate when clear specification of the print area is difficult or when the print site is curved or uneven. "Setting the Print Area Using the Center of the Media as the Base Position" (p. 16)

7. Press [ENTER].

MEMO

Every time you set up the media, you can set the print area (base position and range). For details, refer to "Setting the Print Area for Each Setup of Media" (p. 12).

8. Press [MENU], then [◀] to go back to the original screen.

Setting the Print Area Using the Lower Right of the Media as the Base Position

This is the print area setting method when the print site is level and you can clearly specify the print area.

MEMO

Print area setup can be performed with the front cover open. However, if the front cover is left open for approximately 40 seconds, the print heads automatically return to the home position. The previous menu is displayed, so repeat the operations.

NOTE

Be sure to hold the handle of the front cover and open and close it gently.

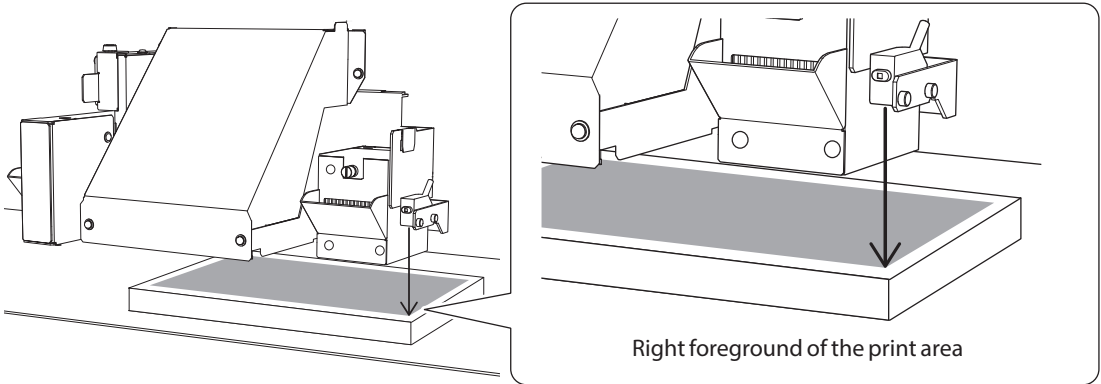
Procedure

1. Set "SET AT SETUP" (p. 13) to "ENABLE."
2. Set "SET BASE POS." (p. 14) to "LOWER R."
3. Set up the media.

The flat table moves to the rear, the print heads move to above the flat table, and the laser pointer turns on.

The print heads return to the home position.

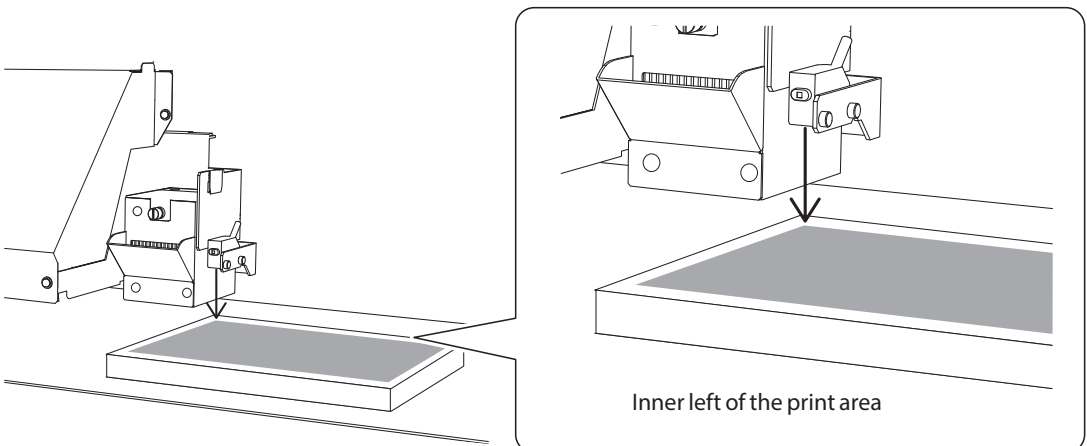

7. Press [▲], [▼], [◀], or [▶].
The flat table moves to the front and the print heads move to the left side of the flat table.

Performing Advanced Setup of the Media

MEMO

For a test print, set "WIDTH" to 80 mm (3.2 in.) or more and "LENGTH" to 70 mm (2.8 in.) or more. An error will occur and test prints cannot be performed if the area is smaller than this.

9. Press [ENTER].
10. If the front cover is open, close it.

The print area is specified. The print heads return to the home position.

Make sure the "W" (width), "L" (length), and "H" (height) values on the menu screen are as intended.

MEMO

If you want to use the print area specified here for the next printing operation, switch "SET AT SETUP" (p. 13) to "DISABLE." With this setting, you can set up the media without setting the print area and base position.

Setting the Print Area Using the Center of the Media as the Base Position

This is the print area setting method that is appropriate when printing on media for which it is difficult to clearly specify the print area or when the print site is curved or uneven.

MEMO

Print area setup can be performed with the front cover open. However, if the front cover is left open for approximately 40 seconds, the print heads automatically return to the home position. The previous menu is displayed, so repeat the operations.

NOTE

Be sure to hold the handle of the front cover and open and close it gently.

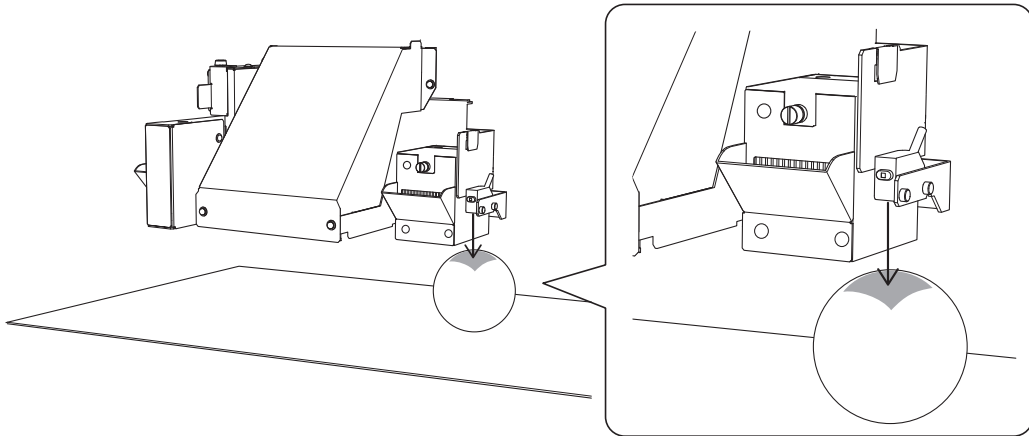
Procedure

1. Set "SET AT SETUP" (p. 13) to "ENABLE."
2. Set "SET BASE POS." (p. 14) to "CENTER."
3. Set up the media.

- If the front cover is open, close it.

The print area is specified. The print heads return to the home position.

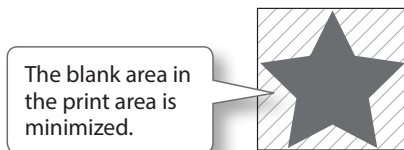
If you want to use the print area specified here for the next printing operation, switch "SET AT SETUP" (p. 13) to "DISABLE." With this setting, you can set up the media without setting the print area and base position.

Specifying the minimum print area enables print time reductions

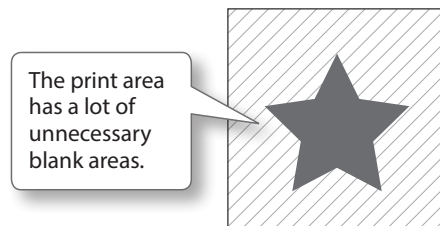
Set "FULL WIDTH S" to "PRTAREA" to narrow the width in which the print heads move, which reduces the print time.

This function is effective when the print area or output data has a small width.

When the laser pointer is difficult to see

Depending on the material used on the media, such as transparent media and high-gloss media with dark color used on the print surface, the laser pointer may be difficult to see. In such cases, the laser pointer may become more visible by placing masking tape on the print surface or on the back.

Check the Print Area

After you change the print area, you can check whether the print area has been set as intended.

Procedure

1. Press [FUNCTION].
2. Press [▼] to display the screen shown below.

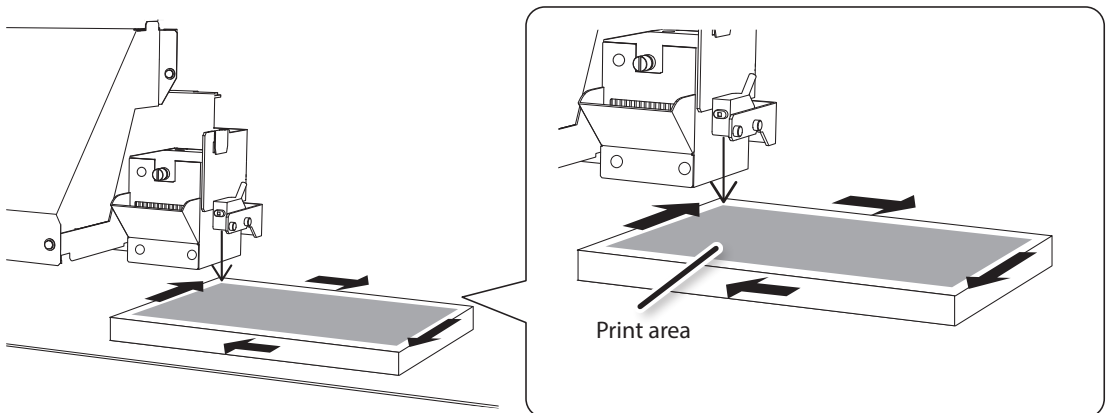
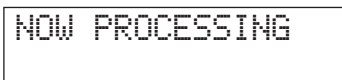


3. Press [▶].



4. Press [ENTER].

The laser pointer displays the print area that has been set.



5. Press [FUNCTION].

The display returns to the original screen.

Optimizing the Printing Quality

Correcting for Misalignment in Bidirectional Printing (Simple)

This adjustment is necessary in the following situations. When printing a test pattern, use the actual media that will be printed on. **The size of the media required to print a (simple) test pattern is 300 × 50 mm (11.8 × 2 in.).**

- When manually setting the height of the media
- When configuring the settings so that the distance between the media and the print heads is expanded automatically
- When changing from manual setup to automatic setup

When the Media You Want to Print On Is Smaller Than the Size of the Test Pattern

- Separate media whose size is correct for printing the test pattern is required.
- Match the media height for the test pattern to the height of the media that will actually be printed on.

Procedure

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] to display the screen shown below.

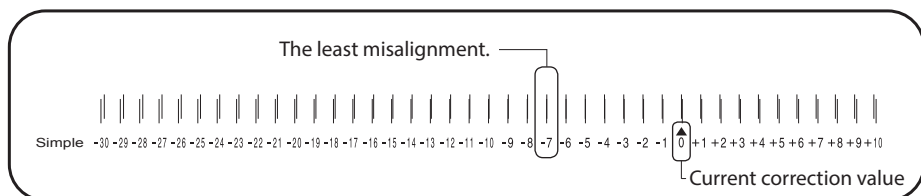

Choose the value that produces the least misalignment of the 2 lines.

Description

This machine prints by the bidirectional mode (in which the heads perform printing during both their outbound pass and return pass). This printing method is called "Bidirectional Printing." This method offers the advantage of being able to shorten output times, but subtle misalignment occurs during the outbound and return passes. The procedure to correct this and eliminate misalignment is "Bidirectional Correction." This misalignment varies according to the print heads height and the thickness of the media, so we recommend performing correction to match the media you are using.

Correcting for Misalignment in Bidirectional Printing More Precisely (Detailed)

This adjustment is necessary in the following situations.

- When using this machine for the first time
- When changing the media to use
- When manually setting the height of the media
- When the printing quality is not improved by performing the simple correction for bidirectional printing in ("Correcting for Misalignment in Bidirectional Printing (Simple)" (p. 20))

1. Output a Test Pattern

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] to display the screen shown below.

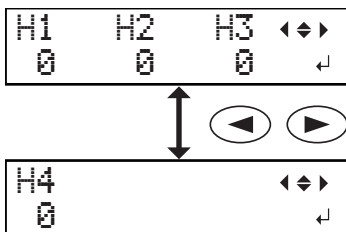

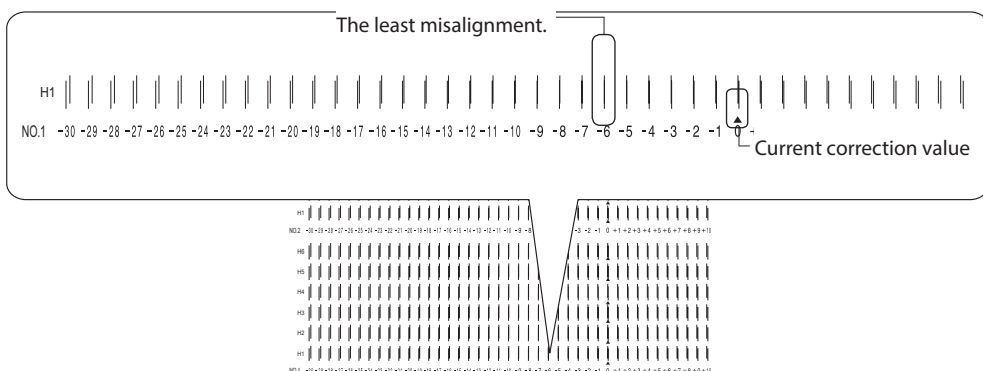

Choose the values that produce the least misalignment of the 2 lines.



If the printing-test results are difficult to interpret

Examine the results from different angles in a well-lit location. Take advantage of reflected light to enable visual checking. Alternatively, change the media and perform the printing again.

If you cannot see "H3" and "H4" (such as for white media with no luster)

You may not be able to see "H3" or "H4" when using certain media, such as white media with no luster. In this situation, set "H3" and "H4" to the "H2" value.

2. Press [▼].
3. In the same manner as performed for [SETTING NO.1], set the correction values for [SETTING NO.2] to [SETTING NO.4].

Preventing Soiling and Dot Drop-Out by Cleaning during Printing

In the following cases, ink tends to collect on the surface of the print heads. Under some conditions, this ink may be transferred to the media or cause dot drop-out.

- When you use media prone to static electricity buildup.
- When the ambient temperature is low.
- When the variation in the unevenness on the print surface is high (there is a limit to the unevenness of the print surface).

☞ "Height Settings When the Print Surface is Uneven" (p. 10)

Use of the periodic cleaning function enables you to perform printing by performing cleaning prior to printing and removing the ink buildup when the set time elapses.

Procedure

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] twice to display the screen shown below.

PERIODIC CL.	Explanation
PAGE	Automatic cleaning is performed every time before printing starts.
5min to 990min	Automatic cleaning is performed each time prior to the start of printing. Cleaning is performed during printing when the cumulative printing time reaches the value you set here. The color may become uneven because the printing is paused.
NONE (Default setting)	Cleaning during printing is not performed.

MEMO

Using "PAGE" or a value from "5min" to "990min" results in longer printing times.

7. Press [ENTER].
8. Press [MENU], then [←] to go back to the original screen.

Reducing Print Quality Degradation from Ink Mist (Ink Spatter)

Under some conditions (such as low temperature or when a static charge is likely), a greater amount of ink mist (ink spatter during printing) may be produced and adversely affect the print quality. In these cases, you may be able to alleviate the symptom by lowering the rotation of the carriage fan.

Procedure

1. Press [MENU].
2. Press [▼] twice to display the screen shown below.

Description

Whether the symptom can be alleviated depends on the temperature and media type. Be sure to check the print status as you adjust the setting. However, the purpose of the carriage fan is to prevent ink buildup on the print heads. Lowering its rotation will lead to more dot drop-outs. This means, if you specify "MIDDLE," "LOW," or "OFF," you should perform normal cleaning more frequently. The "PERIODIC CL." (p. 24) setting is also effective against dot drop-outs.

Re-Curing Ink

When the ink is not completely cured after printing is complete, cure the ink by illuminating it once again with the UV-LED lamp.


A characteristic of UV ink is that it cures quickly when exposed to light from the UV-LED lamp, but curing may be difficult for materials that absorb ink like cloth. This function may alleviate this symptom.

MEMO

- This function cannot be used if media setup has been canceled ([SETUP] is off).
- The UV-LED lamp illuminates the print area configured in media setup.
- The effect depends on the media material.

Procedure

1. Press [FUNCTION].
2. Press [▼] several times to display the screen shown below.

Primer Cleaning

* This cleaning function can only be used when you are using primer (the ink type is ECO-UV CMYKPrGIWW or ECO-UV4 CMYKPrGIWW).

This cleaning prevents dot drop-out for printers equipped with primer.

When print data that includes primer, white, or gloss is output, cleaning is performed if the time that has elapsed since the last cleaning operation exceeds the set time.

- When the media comes into contact with the head gap sensor during automatic readjustment, even if the flat table has moved to the bottom

(*) The maximum value (threshold) for readjustment can be set. Refer to "Determining the Maximum Value (Threshold) for Automatic Height Adjustment" (p. 29).

The greater the distance between the print surface and the print head, the greater the trend for the printing image quality to drop. Therefore, it is beneficial to minimize the adjustment width.

Keep the following points in mind when determining the setting value.

- Consider the effect on the printing image quality in order to obtain satisfactory image quality.
- The variation in height across the entire print surface (not the print target area but including parts that will not be printed)

Continuously Outputting Print Data

When multiple print data entries are sent at a time from the computer, the print data entries can be output in a row.

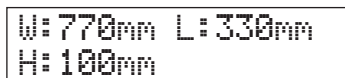

MEMO

For output data whose width gradually narrows (e.g., an inverted triangle), even if "FULL WIDTH S" is set to "OFF," the movement of the print heads may not match the output data. This is to prevent ink-curing failures caused by the print position and is not a malfunction.

Chapter 2

Maintenance

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About Maintenance

Instructions for Maintenance

Switch the power on once every two weeks

Switch the sub power on once every two weeks. When you turn on the power, the machine performs operations to keep the print heads from drying out. Leaving the machine unused for a prolonged period may damage the print heads, so be sure to switch on the power to perform these automatic operations.

Keep the machine at a constant temperature and relative humidity

Even when the machine is not in use, keep it at a temperature of 5 to 40°C (41 to 104°F) and a relative humidity of 20 to 80%RH (with no condensation). Not doing so may cause the machine to break down.

Automatic Maintenance Function and Notes

This machine has a function that automatically performs maintenance periodically. This function performs operations for preventing the print heads from drying out, so:

- Always keep the main power switched on.
- Do not leave the front cover open for a long time.
- Return to the top menu after specifying settings in the menus.

Alarm Function

This function reminds you to switch on the sub power once a month. When the machine remains unused for about a month, this screen appears and a warning buzzer sounds. If this screen appears, switch on the sub power. When maintenance operations finish, switch off the sub power.

This function operates when the printer's main power is turned on. Leave the main power switched on at all times even when the printer is to remain out of use for a prolonged period.

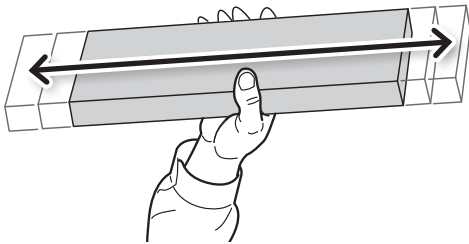
Maintenance Required before and after Printing

Maintenance Required before Printing

Ink Cartridge Maintenance

The components in the ink have a tendency to precipitate. The deposits may harden and cause problems including printer malfunctions if left alone for an extended period of time, and this is especially true for the white ink.

- Shake new ink cartridges 50 times (about 15 seconds) before installing them.
- ☞ "3. Insert the Ink Cartridges for the Respective Colors" (First Step Guide)
- Every day before starting work, remove the white ink cartridges, shake them 50 times (about 15 seconds), and then reinsert them.



Maintenance Required after Printing

Printing Tests and Normal Cleaning

Check for dot drop-out by performing printing tests before and after daily operations. If dot drop-out occurs, perform cleaning of the print heads (normal cleaning). Leaving the dot drop-out untreated may damage the print heads, so be sure to check for this condition each day after operation.

Periodic Maintenance

Cleaning

⚠ WARNING Never use gasoline, alcohol, thinner, or any other flammable material. Doing so may cause a fire.

About Care and Maintenance of the Machine

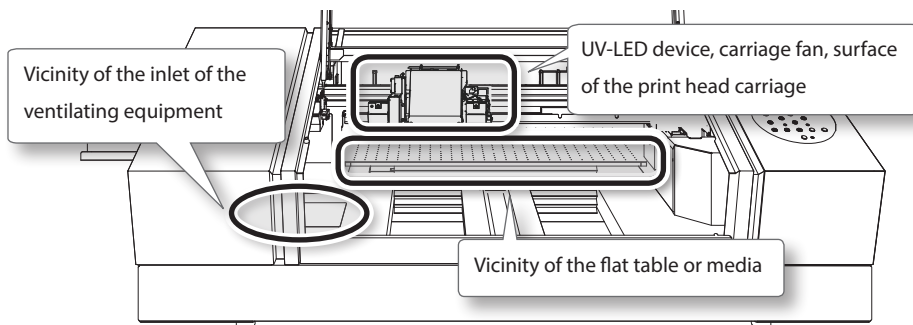
As part of daily cleaning, wipe away any buildup of ink or grime that has adhered to the machine. In particular, the flat table is likely to have a buildup of grime. Clean by wiping with a cloth moistened with neutral detergent diluted with water then wrung dry.

IMPORTANT

- This machine is a precision device and is sensitive to dust and dirt. Perform cleaning on a daily basis.
- Never attempt to oil or lubricate the machine.

About Care and Maintenance of the Inside of the Machine

Frequently clean the inside of the machine using a vacuum cleaner or by wiping with a cloth moistened with water then wrung dry. If dust and dirt accumulate in the machine, they are likely to affix to printed materials.

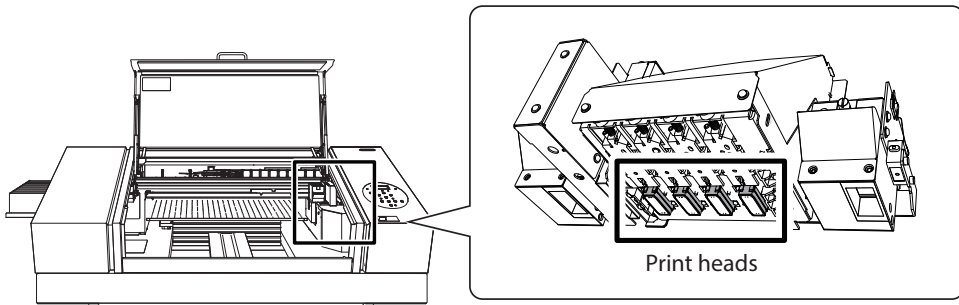


About Care and Maintenance of the Print Heads

Be sure to perform a printing test and normal cleaning before and after daily operations so that you can perform optimum printing at any time. Also perform care and maintenance during daily operations if necessary.

☞ "STEP 3: Printing Tests and Normal Cleaning" (First Step Guide)

The print heads are components that wear out. Periodic replacement is required, with the frequency of replacement depending on use. Contact your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.



Disposing of Discharged Fluid

- ⚠ WARNING** Never place discharged fluid and ink near open flame.
Doing so may cause a fire.
- ⚠ CAUTION** Before you detach the drain bottle, be sure to wait for the screen to display [EMPTY DRAIN BOTTLE].
Failing to follow this procedure may cause discharged fluid to flow out of the machine and spill, soiling your hands or the floor.
- ⚠ CAUTION** To store discharged fluid temporarily, place it in the included drain bottle or in a durable sealed container such as a metal can or plastic tank, and cap the container tightly.
Any spillage or vapor leakage may cause a fire, odor, or physical distress.

Do not store discharged fluid in a location where it is exposed to direct sunlight.

When temporarily storing discharged fluid in the included drain bottle, do not store it in a location that is exposed to direct sunlight. The discharged fluid may harden, making the drain bottle unusable.

Dispose of discharged fluid properly, in accordance with the laws in effect in your locale.

Discharged fluid is flammable and contains toxic ingredients. Never attempt to incinerate discharged fluid or discard it with ordinary trash. Also, do not dispose of it in sewer systems, rivers, or streams. Doing so may have an adverse impact on the environment.

When "EMPTY DRAIN BOTTLE" Is Displayed

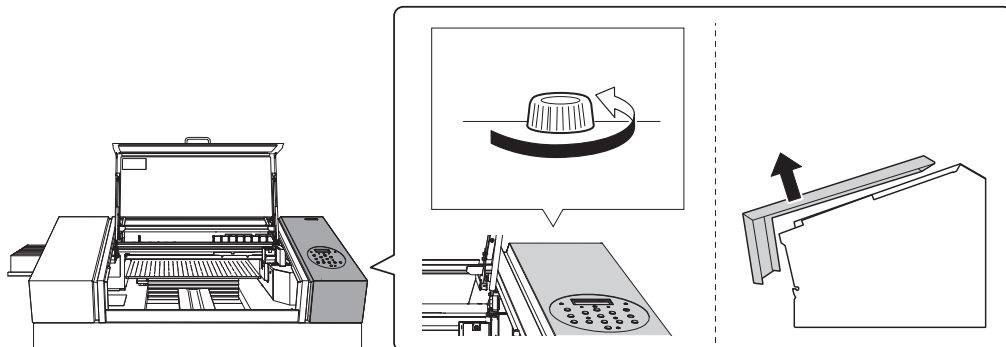
The message shown in the figure appears when a certain amount of discharged fluid has collected in the bottle.



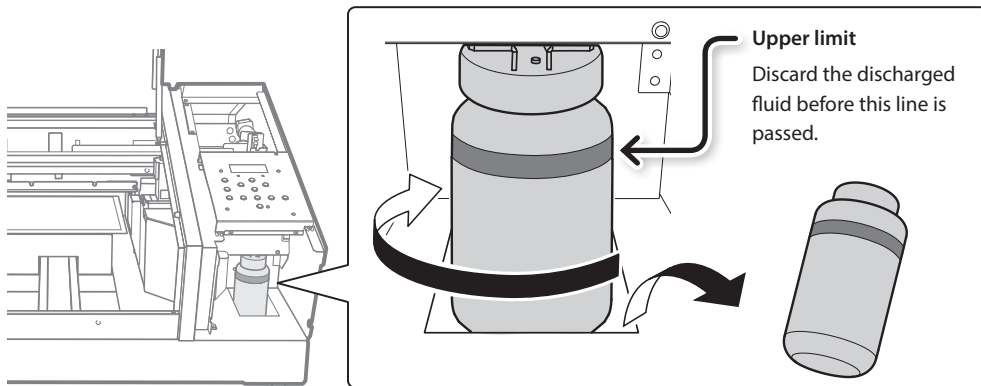
Follow the procedure below to discard the discharged fluid.

1. Open the panel cover.

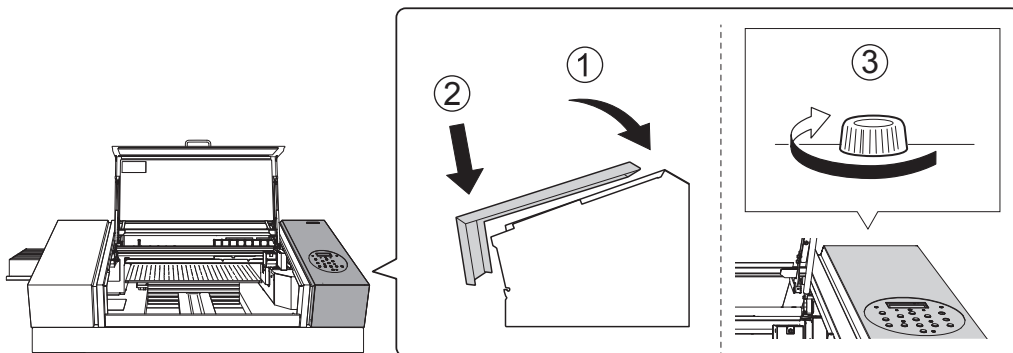
Remove the screw on the top of the panel cover, and then pull out the panel cover in the direction indicated by the arrow.



- Remove the drain bottle and empty it to discard the discharged ink.



- Attach the emptied drain bottle to the machine once more.
- Close the panel cover.



- Press [ENTER].



- Press [◀] or [▶] to select "YES."
- Press [ENTER].

NOTE

The "EMPTY DRAIN BOTTLE" message also disappears when you select "NO" and press [ENTER] without discarding the discharged fluid.

If "EMPTY DRAIN BOTTLE" appears again, you should discard the discharged fluid, if you can. Repeatedly selecting "NO" without discarding the discharged fluid may cause it to spill out of the drain bottle, soiling your hands or the floor.

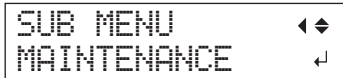
Discarding the Discharged Fluid before the Message Appears

Manual Cleaning

When manual cleaning becomes necessary

When there is a lot of scattered ink mist and the inside of the machine is soiled

Perform this cleaning every day when frequently printing with the print heads at a distance from the print surface or when ink is emitted to locations that protrude from the print surface. If the scattered ink mist is allowed to harden, it may cause malfunctions.

Perform manual cleaning once a month or more





If symptoms such as those shown below persist even after you have performed cleaning such as normal cleaning, perform manual cleaning.

Replacing the wipers is also an effective means of improving the symptoms.

- The frequency with which manual cleaning should be performed depends on the machine's use. For information about the frequency of cleaning needed for your conditions of use, contact your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.
- If you use up the cleaning sticks and cleaning liquid used for manual cleaning, contact your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.
- The print heads are components that wear out. Periodic replacement is required, with the frequency of replacement depending on use. Contact your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.

Important notes on this procedure

- Cleaning requires the cleaning liquid and cleaning sticks included with the printer, so have these items ready.
- Before performing this operation, remove any media.
- To prevent the print heads from drying out, finish this procedure in 10 minutes or less. A warning beep sounds after 10 minutes.
- Never use any implement other than the included cleaning stick. Cotton swabs or other lint producing items may damage the print heads. If you use up the cleaning stick, purchase a new one from your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.
- Use one cleaning stick per cleaning session. Reusing cleaning sticks may reduce print quality.
- Do not put a cleaning stick that has been used for cleaning into the cleaning liquid. It may deteriorate the fluid.
- Never rub the nozzle surface of the print heads.
- Stroke the sponges very gently, applying as little pressure as possible. Never rub, scrape, or crush them.

When a warning beep sounds during cleaning

A warning beep sounds 10 minutes after operation begins. Stop work, close the front cover, and then press [ENTER] to end the manual cleaning mode. After that, restart the procedure from the beginning.



If ink components precipitate, it will not be possible to print with correct colors. So that the ink mixes well, shake each ink cartridge horizontally with a stroke length of around 5 cm (2 in.) from each end of the ink cartridge.

3. Pull out the empty ink cartridge and immediately insert the new one.



4. Close the front cover.

Important notes on replacing ink cartridges

- Be sure to replace each cartridge with an item of identical type.
- Never mix items of different types.
- Never leave the machine with an ink cartridge removed. The print heads may become clogged.
- Never insert or remove a partially used ink cartridge with undue force.
- Never remove an ink cartridge suddenly while the printer is in operation.



WARNING Never store ink, cleaning liquid, or discharged fluid in any of the following locations.

- Any location exposed to open flame
 - Any location where high temperature may occur
 - Near bleach or any other such oxidizing agent or explosive material
 - Any location within the reach of children
- Fire may be a danger. Accidental ingestion by children may pose a health hazard.

When the White Ink Concentration Is Low

Restoring the White Ink Concentration

Prolonged use of this machine may cause the concentration of the white ink to decrease. This is because the components in the white ink easily precipitate. The "CIRCULATE INK" function circulates the ink to eliminate white ink precipitation, which restores the white ink concentration.

MEMO

This procedure requires some ink to be discharged, so we do not recommend that you perform this procedure frequently.

MEMO

White ink tends to settle and may harden if left alone for a lengthy time. Therefore, abnormal ink emission including dot drop-out tends to occur more frequently than with other inks, even when using the cleaning function (normal, medium, or powerful) or manual cleaning.

- A large amount of ink will be discharged during this operation. Perform this operation only when ink emission failures (such as dot drop-out) cannot be improved even after performing "normal," "medium," "powerful," and "manual" cleaning.

When Moving the Unit

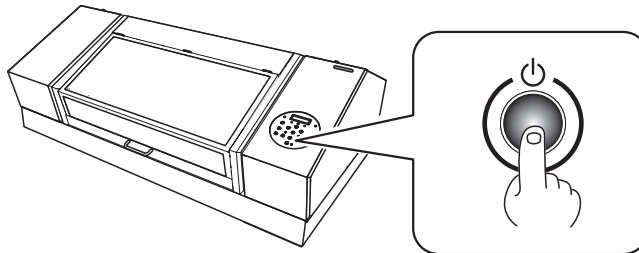
The Print Heads Do Not Move

If the print-head carriage stops anywhere other than the home position (the right side of the main unit), take action immediately to prevent the heads from drying out.

What to Do First

Switch the sub power off, then back on again.

If the print-head carriage moves to the home position (the right side of the main unit), the operation has ended successfully.



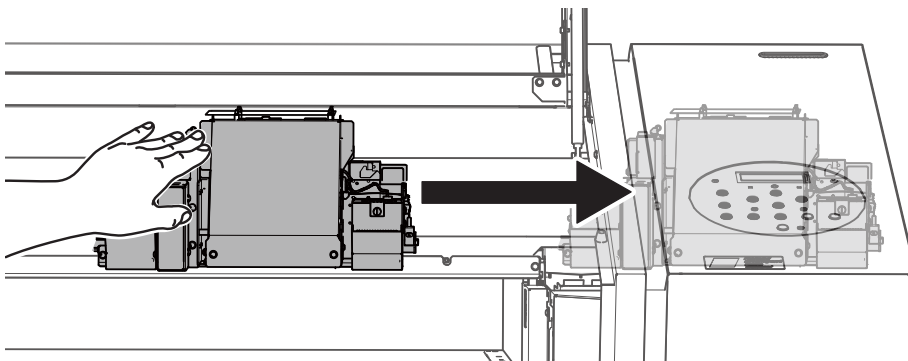
If the Heads Still Do Not Move

Try switching off the main power, then switching on the main power again, followed by the sub power.

If the heads still do not move, carry out the following emergency response measure, and then contact your authorized Roland DG Corp. dealer.

Procedure

1. Turn off the main power switch.
2. Open the front cover.
3. Gently move the print-head carriage to the home position by hand.
Stop when you hear the print-head carriage click into place.



4. Close the front cover.

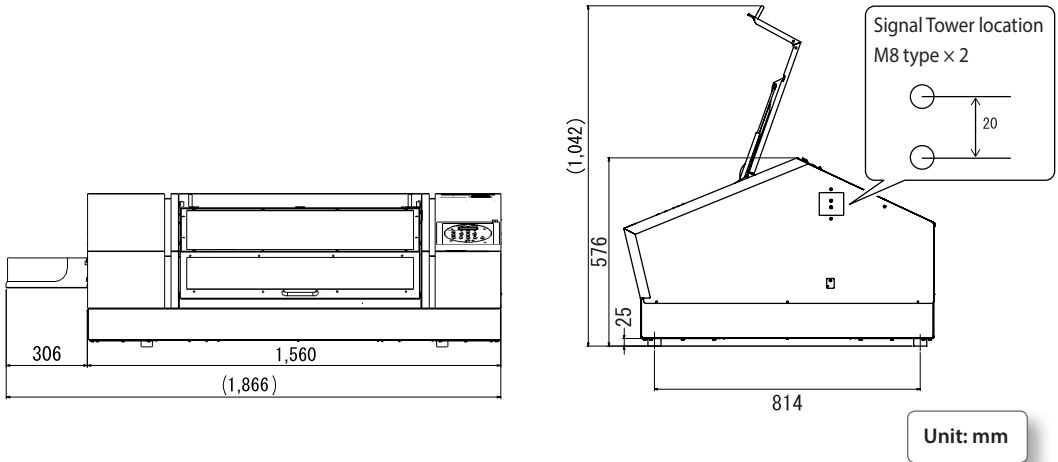

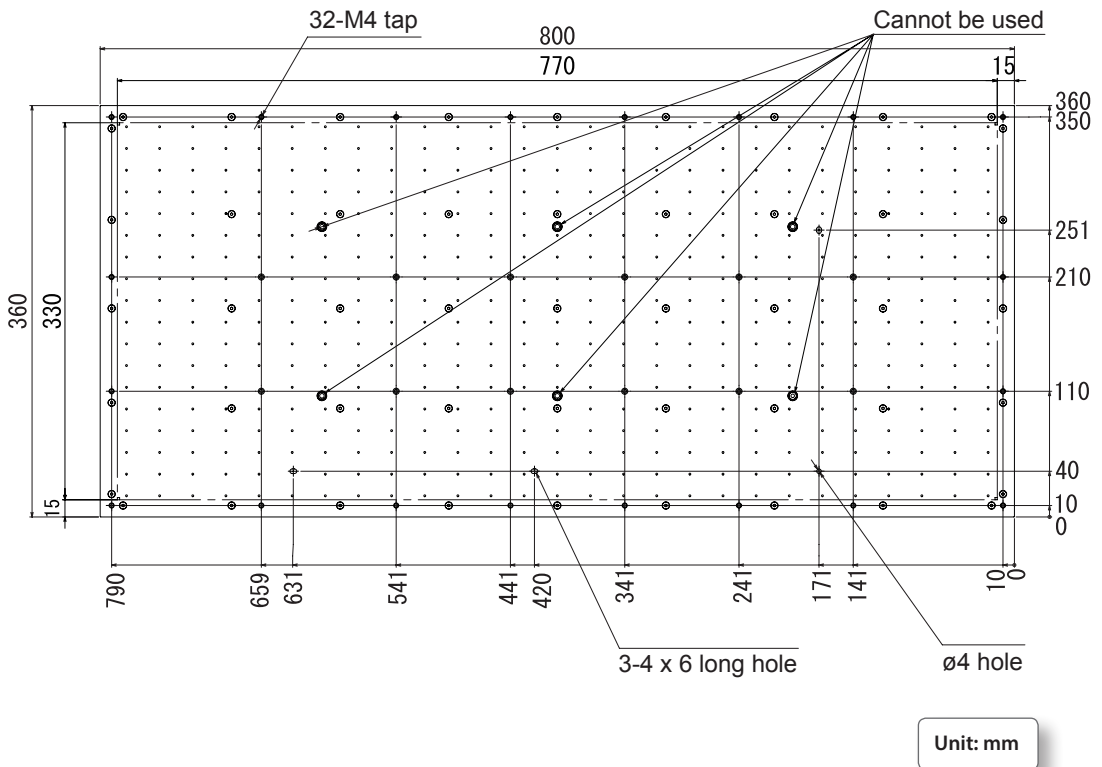

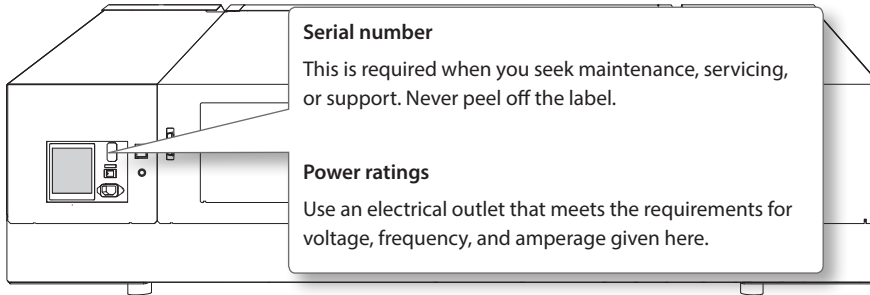

Locations of the Power Rating and Serial Number Label



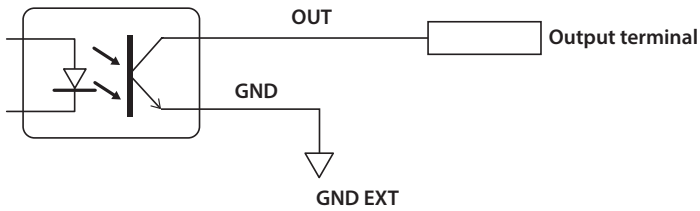
